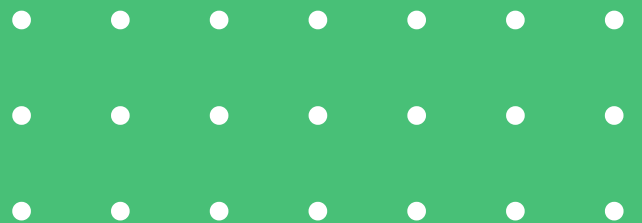

INTRODUCTION

Buying a home is one of life's biggest achievements, but owning it comes with the responsibility of regular upkeep. I. House Maintenance Requirements: What it is, How it Works

A house maintenance requirement is the level of minimum margin account equity that is required by a brokerage firm. House maintenance requirement levels are based on the standards set out in Regulation T of the Federal Reserve.

How House Maintenance Requirements Work

The purpose of maintenance requirements is to ensure that investors using margin accounts to make leveraged investments do not find themselves unable to repay their margin loans. In this manner, maintenance requirements are intended to reduce credit risk for the brokerage firms. By extension, they aim to reduce the systemic risk that might otherwise arise from widespread defaults by margin traders.

Bull vs. Bear Markets: Why Maintenance Requirements Are Necessary

During bull markets, margin traders may find their maintenance requirements to be unduly restrictive. When asset prices are generally rising, it can be tempting to leverage as much as possible in order to maximize return on equity (ROE).

However, the danger of this quickly reveals itself once the market begins to turn. During bear markets or periods of sudden financial shock such as occurred in the 2007–2008 financial crisis, margin traders are often faced with significant risk.

The decline in portfolio values, combined with the need to repay large margin loans on short notice due to margin calls, can sometimes force margin traders into significant financial duress.

What is the minimum maintenance requirement?

The minimum maintenance requirement by law is 25%, which was set out by Regulation T. However, brokers are free to be more rigorous and most are.¹

What does a 30% maintenance requirement mean?

A maintenance requirement of 30% means an investor borrowing on margin must have at least 30% of the total market value of the securities in their margin account at all times. So, if the securities that you borrowed money to buy are valued at \$20,000, the maintenance requirement would be \$6,000.

What is a special maintenance requirement?

The same maintenance requirements are not uniformly applied to everyone and everything. Some securities can carry higher maintenance requirements because they are deemed riskier. That's usually the case with more volatile or less liquid investments.⁵

A house maintenance requirement is the minimum equity an investor must hold in their margin account after making a purchase. Once a security is bought on margin, the requirement kicks in.

II. The Ultimate Home Maintenance Checklist Monthly and by Season

Regular home maintenance is taking proactive and preventative measures to keep your home in good working order and not being neglectful or waiting for something to go awry. - **Winter:** Focus on damage control, keep the roof intact, and prevent ice dams. Clean the garage and basement.
- **Spring:** Watch for spring flooding, repair winter damage to home exterior and trees.
- **Summer:** Take on ambitious projects like exterior painting, building drainage systems, or replacing doors or windows—tasks that rely on perfect weather.
- **Fall:** Prepare for the winter, clean gutters, and install storm doors and windows.

Monthly Home Maintenance

Every month, check the safety devices, ensure the water and air systems are running smoothly, and check for the accumulation of dust or debris that can interfere with the regular operation of the home's systems.

- Change the HVAC filters, including the furnace filter.
- Press your smoke and carbon monoxide detector buttons to ensure they work. Replace batteries as needed.
- Check sink, shower, and tub drains for clogs and clear them, if necessary.
- For low-use areas such as guest or basement bathrooms, flush the toilet, clean sediment rings from the bowl, and turn on both sink taps.

- If you use a water softener system, check and replenish the salt levels, if necessary.
- Test all of the GFCI outlets to ensure they are working correctly.
- Inspect electrical cords for wear.

Regular Quarterly Home Maintenance

Every three months, perform these critical maintenance tasks:

- Check the gauges on your fire extinguishers to ensure they are still correctly pressurized.
- Check your water heater's temperature and pressure (T&P) valve to ensure it will expel water. Place a bucket below the relief tube to avoid flooding.
- Ensure your garage door's safety reverse function works and the electric eyes are correctly positioned.
- Remove showerheads and sink aerators and soak them in vinegar to clean out collected sediment.

Winter Home Maintenance Checklist

- From a safely secured ladder, check gutters and the lower roof for ice dams and eliminate them as necessary. Be careful of ice when accessing the roof. Avoid going on the roof in the morning. Wait until the ice has melted, later in the afternoon.
- Check that the covers are on the outside hose bibs (faucets) and have not iced up.
- Make sure that the yard is not pooling up with water. While you probably won't be able to create a full-scale yard drainage system in winter, you will want to ensure that none of that water is near the foundation. If so, grade the soil away from the house to prevent interior flooding.
- Use this indoor-friendly season to clean the basement, garage, and other interior spaces that get neglected during warm, sunny months.
- Keep an eye on your electrical service drop and the line that leads from your home to the power pole (only if you have above-ground electric service). If large branches have fallen or are hanging on the line, call the electric company for removal.

Spring Home Maintenance Checklist

Spring home maintenance is chiefly about cleaning up after the mess and damage of winter. Weather is still spotty, so this isn't the best time to take on long-term outside projects like painting the house—this comes later on.



- Clean the gutters and, using a water hose, ensure they drain.
- Check the exterior siding for damage and repair as needed.
- Check shingles, flashing, and vents for damage when the roof is dry and safe to walk on.
- Clean and replace window screens.
- Trim back trees that may deposit branches on your home. For branches near power lines, call your electric company for pruning.
- In late spring, install window unit air conditioners.
- Reverse ceiling fans so that the vanes rotate in a counter-clockwise direction. This will move air downward, cooling the room.
- Thoroughly clean the windows with a squeegee.

Summer Home Maintenance Checklist

With higher temperatures and low precipitation, summer affords comfortable working conditions to make intensive repairs that were impossible in prior seasons. In many areas, midsummer is the best time to take on projects that might be ruined by poor weather.

- Make repairs to the home's siding and paint the exterior as needed.
- Clean and repair your outside deck.
- Wash and apply a sealant to wood fences with a brush, roller, or paint sprayer.
- Flush out your water heater to empty it of sediment.
- Clean debris from window wells with a broom.
- If you noted any drainage problems from previous seasons, now is the time to consider building a robust drainage system with catch basins in your yard.
- Inspect the roof for loose shingles and flashing.
- Replace windows and exterior doors as needed.
- Have an HVAC company inspect the furnace and make necessary repairs.

Fall Home Maintenance Checklist

Home maintenance during the fall season is focused on preparing the house for winter.

- Test the sump pump by pouring water down the sump pit until the pump turns on.
- Remove, clean, and store the window screens.
- If your home has storm windows, install them.
- Remove window unit air conditioners. If you have central air conditioning, winterize it.
- Contact HVAC professionals for annual maintenance on the furnace.
- Call in a chimney cleaning service or clean the chimney by yourself.
- Winterize exterior hose bibs (faucets) by protecting them with foam covers.
- Remove leaves and debris from garden ponds and water features.
- Reverse ceiling fans so that the vanes rotate in a clockwise direction. This will help distribute the warm air that collects near the ceiling.

1. Front door



Your front door is the gateway to your home, providing that all-important first impression, and deserves regular attention to maintain its appearance.

Hometalk editor Amy Poulton says, "This might sound obvious, but possibly the most overlooked part of your entryway is the front door itself! Yet it's the first thing guests will see and touch."

Amy says: "Mix warm water with dish soap or vinegar in a bucket. Dip a sponge (not abrasive!), wash the door, and rinse thoroughly. Dry with a microfiber cloth to prevent streaks.

"If you have windows in your front door, use glass cleaner or the same dish soap or vinegar mixture. Then, use a squeegee in smooth strokes from top to bottom of the windows to remove excess water and prevent streaks. If you don't have a squeegee, simply dry the windows thoroughly with your microfiber cloth."

2. Door handles



Door handles are high-touch areas that can harbor germs and bacteria. Regular cleaning is essential to maintain hygiene.

Amy says, "Door handles are easily forgotten about all over the home, but passing on germs is the last way you want to welcome your guests!"

"Your front door handle — and any others in your entryway — are getting touched all the time as you come and go but are rarely cleaned, so make sure you add them to your weekly cleaning routine.

3. Door mat



For most of us, it's the first thing we encounter when we enter our home, and it's a place specifically designed to get dirty. Yet your entryway doormat is often completely overlooked when it comes to your cleaning routine.

Lina adds, "After scrubbing, rinse the mat with clean water and allow it to dry completely before placing it back. This prevents mold growth so it's a vital step."

Some doormats are machine washable — always check and follow the manufacturer's instructions.

4. Light fixtures



Light fixtures in the entryway can collect dust and cobwebs, diminishing their brightness, along with those all-important first impressions.

Karina Toner, operations manager at Spekless Cleaning, says: "Ceiling or wall-mounted light fixtures in your entryway can gather dust and dead bugs over time.

"To clean, start by turning off the power to the light fixture at the circuit breaker to ensure safety. Carefully remove the fixture cover or shade then use a soft-bristled brush or vacuum attachment to gently remove dust and debris from the fixture.

"Wipe down the fixture with a damp cloth or sponge and mild dish soap. Dry the fixture thoroughly before reattaching the cover or shade. Turn the power back on and you're good to go."

5. Baseboards

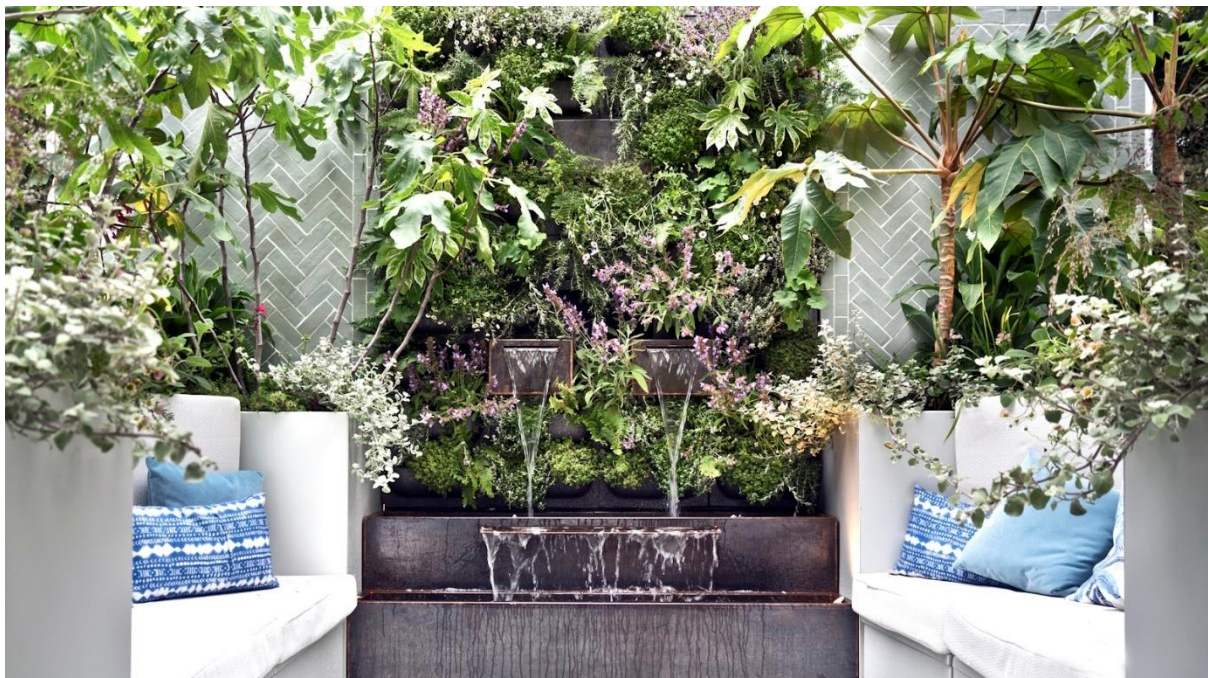
Baseboards are often overlooked but love to accumulate dust and dirt, making your entryway look neglected.

Karina says, "Baseboards are often overlooked because they're low down and out of sight for the most part. However, they can accumulate dust, pet hair, and grime over time.

"To clean them, begin by vacuuming or sweeping the baseboards to remove loose debris. Next, mix a solution of warm water and mild dish soap in a bucket. Dampen a microfiber cloth or sponge in the soapy water and wring out excess moisture. Wipe down the baseboards thoroughly, paying attention to any stubborn spots and in corners.

"Rinse the cloth or sponge frequently and change the water if it gets too dirty. Once cleaned, dry the baseboards with a clean towel or leave a fan on to air dry."

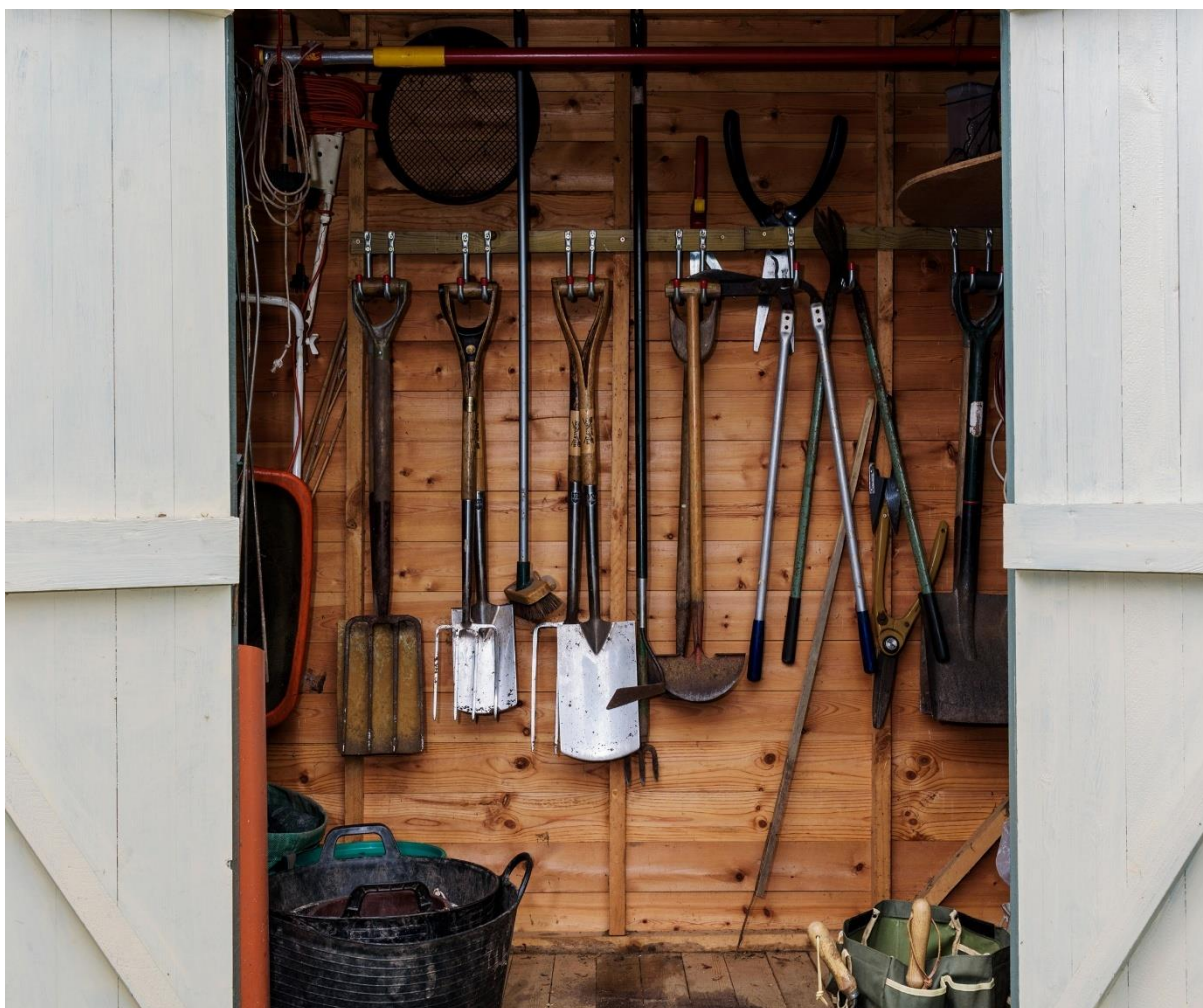
IV. Things people with tidy gardens always do – for an elegant, serene outdoor space

1. Plan in smart storage and think vertically

Eliminating any broken, damaged or tired tools, play equipment and accessories is not just cathartic but practical too as it will provide a clearer idea of what needs to be stored away and how much space is required. Be sure to conduct a regular audit – late fall, early winter is the perfect time as we are outside less – and be realistic what can be kept, especially if outdoor space is limited.

Clever backyard storage ideas are key to maintaining a tidy garden. Essentials – such as mower, tools, cushions, sacks of compost and BBQ kit – all need their place, so any time spent squeezing in new sheds, garden stores, cubby holes and shelving is a positive step.

2. Sharpen up lawn and border edges



If key elements of your backyard look crisp and on point, then the rest of the space will benefit too. In any modern or contemporary garden design the points where different surfaces meet will always draw the eye, so it makes sense to ensure they are looking their best. 4. Screen everyday essentials

The simple answer is to screen them off, particularly if they in full view from inside the house or next to an alfresco dining or entertaining area.

Growing a hedge is a great way to screen off an undesirable view while also supporting nature. Swapping an eyesore for a lush and leafy barrier is a really smart design move, particularly if you opt for an evergreen shrub such as yew or privet, or hero such as beech that hangs on to its leaves pretty much all year round. There are also plenty of flowering hedges worth considering too. Planting a row of a single plant species will result in an even and dense backdrop, that can be clipped neatly into shape, but a mix of native species will provide seasonal color and a wider resource for garden birds and mammals. A good healthy hedge will need careful planting preparation and regular pruning, it will also take up more space than a fence or screen, so not always suited to smaller yards.

5. Choose the right compact and groundcover plants



Choosing the right plants for your yard not only depends on the climate, soil conditions, aspect etc but also your design preference and the amount of maintenance you wish to do. 'First, look for plant cultivars with compact growth habit - these will have been bred to constrain untidy growth like long leggy stems or variable height and width,' says perennial and bulb expert Megan Foster.

'Second, consider edging plantings with groundcovers to give your beds a more finished look. Groundcovers can fill in the blank expanses between young perennials and shrubs that are commonly covered with mulch, all while adding a low growing layer of attractive foliage and sometimes flowers as well.

'Much like a great outfit has perfect accessories, groundcovers can really pull a look together and make it feel more ordered and complete in a garden setting.'

Regularly Dispose of Trash

Patch Exterior Holes

If it seems like pests have superpowers for tracking down food sources, that's because they do. Ants, for example, have about five times as many odor receptors as other insects, according to Terminix—which helps them smell that leftover apple pie sitting out on the counter from quite a distance. For that reason, you can prevent pests from coming into the home by using smell-blocking, securely sealed containers

for your food. That goes for items left out on your counter as well as anything in your pantry.

Deep Clean the Home

VI. How to Deep-Clean Every Room in Your House

A deep cleaning doesn't have to be an overwhelming, impossible task. Use these tips to tackle each room quickly and effectively.

How to Deep Clean Your House

As you go through each room in your home, begin with these deep cleaning tips to streamline the process.

1. Declutter Before Deep Cleaning

Find a new place for (or better yet, get rid of) any visible clutter that does not belong in the room. Save the stuff behind closed doors for another day to help simplify your deep cleaning checklist. Clearing clutter makes deep cleaning easier and seeing those tidy surfaces can help boost your motivation to keep going.

2. Start High, Go Low

Tackle large, hard-to-reach surfaces in this order: ceiling, ceiling trim, ceiling light fixtures (including bulbs), walls, the rest of the trim, and baseboards. The best tools for these surfaces are clean microfiber mops, dusters with a telescoping handles, or sanitizing cleaning wipes. Bonus: These tools are typically thin enough to get behind the sofa without moving it. Above eye-level, a spritz of water is all you need on the mop. Surfaces closer to the floor tend to build up dirt and dust, so use warm water mixed with a drop of dish soap. In bathrooms, add a splash of white vinegar to the mixture to stop mold and mildew. For spots where using a mop is awkward or inconvenient, use a microfiber cleaning cloth. Rinse often and wring thoroughly.

3. Deep Clean Windows

Cleaning windows is fairly simple, and the payoff is huge. First, vacuum the sills and tracks. Then spritz the window with glass cleaner from top to bottom. Let the cleaner do its thing for a minute, then squeegee it off. If you wipe in one direction on the inside and another on the outside windows, it will be easier to see and fix streaks.

Room-by-Room Deep Cleaning House Checklist

Follow these steps to deep clean every room in your home.

How to Deep Clean Your Bedroom



1. **Launder Bedding.** Wash the pillows, shams, duvet cover, bed skirt, and even down-filled items. Give them an extra spin cycle to make drying faster, and dry down pillows on low with clean tennis balls to prevent clumping. The

best way to dry synthetic pillows is by air-drying them outdoors. For bulky comforters, hit the laundromat and use one of the extra-large front-loaders.

2. **Freshen Mattress.** While your bed is disassembled, clean your mattress. Sprinkle baking soda on the mattress, let it sit for an hour, then vacuum it up using the hose attachment. To extend the life of your mattress, flip or rotate the mattress per the manufacturer's advice and repeat the process.

How to Deep Clean the Kitchen

1. **Polish Cabinets.** Wipe the exposed tops first, then cut newspaper or shelf liners to fit inside. The lining collects the dust, so next time all you'll have to do is replace the paper. Next, wipe the cabinet doors front and back with wood cleaner (for painted or laminate surfaces, use warm water with a squirt of dish soap). You can also try the tube sock trick here: Put one on each hand, spritz with cleaner, and wipe in circular motions.

How to Deep Clean the Bathroom

1. **Wash Shower Curtain.** Check the label first, but most shower curtains can be washed with the gentle cycle on cold. Set the dryer on low and remove and rehang the curtain before it's completely dry. Either wash the plastic shower liner on cold and hang it to dry, or purchase a new one.
2. **Make Shower Doors Sparkle.** To get rid of water spots and soap scum, heat distilled white vinegar and wipe it on the doors, reapplying to keep them wet for 30 minutes. Then scrub with baking soda sprinkled on a non-scratch pad. To keep the shower cleaner longer, add a squeegee and switch to glycerin soap. Animal fat and talc in regular soap leave that icky residue.
3. **Declutter Vanity and Cabinets.** Bring order to the chaos under the sink. Pull everything out, toss what doesn't belong there, wipe down what does, and reload it by category. Repeat for your medicine cabinet or any additional cabinetry.

How to Deep Clean the Living Room and Family Room

1. **Freshen Furniture.** Remove cushions and vacuum every upholstered surface, including the backs, with the brush attachment.
2. **Dust Frames.** Take all framed artwork and photos down and dust them front and back using a damp microfiber cloth. Be careful not to spray anything directly on the glass. It could seep into the corners of the frame and potentially ruin the picture and mat.
3. **Dust Under Electronics.** You don't need to unhook and move everything to clean around your electronics. Just use an ultra-thin dusting wand and run it under the components.
