#### **Best Places to Visit in Kerala**

### A Contrasting Landscape

Start in the misty hill station of Munnar, where vast tea plantations stretch across rolling slopes, the air turns crisp and viewpoints like Echo Point and Top Station reveal panoramic vistas. ([turn0search1]turn0search0) The next day you might drift on a houseboat through the backwaters of Alleppey (Alappuzha) and witness palm-lined canals, villages perched on stilts

#### **Culture, History & Traditions**

Kerala is not just about landscapes — its heritage runs deep. In Kochi (Cochin) you'll explore colonial-era Fort Kochi, Chinese fishing nets, spice-market lanes and art galleries. ([turn0news23]turn0search1) Meanwhile the state's temples, churches and mosques reflect a plural society where festivals like Onam bring entire communities together with floral carpets (pookalams), traditional boat races and harvest feasts. ([turn0search8]turn0search1) Visit the tea towns, spice plantations and the tea-factory tours to uncover rural rhythms and centuries-old traditions.

#### **Signature Destinations & Highlights**

- **Munnar**: Explore Eravikulam National Park, trek among tea-terraces, breathe the cool mountain air. ([turn0search0]turn0search1)
- Alleppey (Backwaters): Stay on a traditional *kettuvallam* (houseboat), savour meals served on banana leaves, glide through palms and waterways. ([turn0search4]turn0search5)
- **Thekkady / Periyar**: Enter the wildlife zone of Periyar National Park boat rides, jungle treks, cinnamon-scented air and spice gardens await. ([turn0search3]turn0search2)
- **Wayanad**: Hidden in the Western Ghats, this region offers treks such as Chembra Peak, ancient caves and untouched forests. ([turn0news19]turn0search1)
- **Beaches & Coast**: Varkala's cliff-edge beach, Kovalam's lighthouse and tranquil stretches are perfect for unwinding. ([turn0search6]turn0search4)

### **Best Time & Travel Logistics**

The best time to visit depends on what you want:

• Hill stations like Munnar: October to March bring clear skies and cool temps.

- Backwaters & beaches: September to February is ideal for calm water, gentle weather and fewer rains.
- Monsoon months (June–August) bring lush green scenery but heavy rainfall and some disruptions. ([turn0search5]turn0search1)

Access is relatively easy: fly into Kochi or Trivandrum airports, travel by kerala's scenic roads, stay in houseboats, homestays or resorts depending on preference. Try local cuisine — rice with coconut curries, fresh seafood, banana-leaf meals — for an authentic touch.
